During Friendship Week, pupils will look at what qualities make a good friend. As part of PSHE, they will think about what a safe relationship is, respect in the community and how diversity improves the society that we live in. Also, during week commencing 2nd October we will be discussing puberty (more information to follow).

During science lessons, children in Year 6/5 classes will be looking at the Earth and space, as well as the circulatory systems. Throughout these units, pupils will be developing their skills in scientific investigation. Creating and manipulating images will be covered in computing. To ensure that children are continually aware of its importance, E-Safety will be taught throughout the year in the first week of each half-term. In geography, we will be looking at the impacts of climate change on the poles and also the effects of the wildfires that have occurred over the summer. The Mayans will be studied in history and children will learn about this ancient civilisation.

This year, we are excited to introduce a new Essex approved R.E. scheme. This will allow the children to develop their philosophical and theological questioning. We are happy to welcome back Roots to Food which is part of the D.T. curriculum. Basketball, gymnastics, as well as multi-skills, will be taught in P.E. In music, children will learn about the differences between live and digital sounds and will be using their knowledge to create their own music. Children will be learning about shops, directions and Christmas in French.

HOMEWORK

In Upper Key Stage 2, homework will be set weekly on Thursdays to be turned in by the following Tuesday. If homework is late, then pupils will have to complete the work during lunchtime on a Wednesday, unless parents have informed us of any exceptional circumstances.

READING

The expectation is that all pupils in the school read at least four times a week to an adult. If they haven't then year 6/5 pupils will complete their reading during the first 15 minutes of a Friday lunchtime.

The very enjoyable Roots to Food roadshow will once again be making their annual visit to our school on Friday the 29^{th} of September, where the children will learn a dish to cook with you at home!
